A newcomer's view of **Stow Community Land Trust**

At our Formal Board Meeting on 23 June 2022, a new member - Ruth Cole - joined us and made a dynamic contribution to the meeting. She and our Deputy Chairman, Moyra McGhie, have since spent an exhilarating afternoon looking at potential sites around Stow. Ruth has written a lovely article on her personal reasons for joining Stow CLT; it is an insight into one member's personal motivation:

I came to Stow in April 2022 and heard about Stow Community Land Trust at the annual Town Council meeting; I could relate to the values of equal access to housing in a beautiful area like Stow, so I joined up.

I can see that although Stow appears to be thriving in many ways, if the people who work here can't afford to live here, it creates two particular stresses on the environment for everyone:

1. Traffic bottle necks at the two main sets of lights filtering cars into Stow. Crossing the Fosse Way for pedestrians is difficult, and as a grandmother myself I would not want to push my grandchild

out fumes at pushchair height. As a car driver, I have waited 20 minutes to get into Stow from these lights which seems so strange in the middle of beautiful countryside. Key workers have to live elsewhere and drive into Stow every day; more people living closer to their work would relieve the pressure on the major roads.

2. The workers feel excluded or not welcome because their incomes do not match the residents who do own houses in Stow. I know of a hairdresser in Stow who lives 30 miles away, commuting most days, occasionally staying with her mother in Stow. My uncle had a carer, driving for 30 minutes to do one and a half hours caring.

My view is that Stow Community Land Trust should pursue the idea of houses for rent in perpetuity when purchasing and developing land for truly affordable housing. Rental properties give a flexibility that privately owned houses do not allow. People can move into Stow and out again as their circumstances require and the maximum number of people will benefit.

People on low incomes still want to live in beautiful places like Stow. Why should it be the preserve of the rich? To me, that is not a just situation and I past the queue of cars pumping admire the CLT for trying to

change this.

At the most recent meeting of Stow CLT, we heard about 4 flats for sale in a block for £500,000 and wondered whether we could get together 500 people to put in £1,000 to purchase them? Although this sounds a very small project, it could be a model for the future. Many people say in consultations that they want a more balanced community, let us see if they will put their money where their mouths are.
